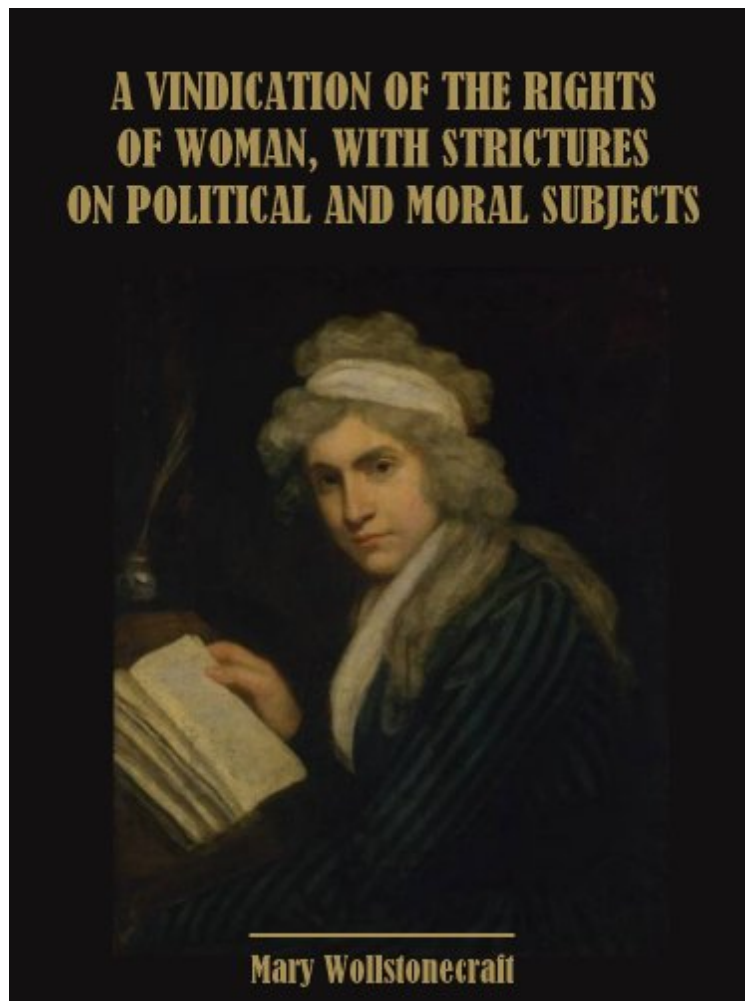

Mary Wollstonecraft proves herself to be an extremely wise, intelligent and insightful woman. Although the position of woman in the society do not correspond exactly to the one described by Wollstonecraft, there are definitely twentieth century contemporaries to the methods used to subjugate woman 200 years ago.

Kurzbeschreibung This book is an illustrated version of the original *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman*, with *Strictures on Political and Moral Subjects* by Mary Wollstonecraft. We can scarcely avoid regret that one of such splendid talents, and high toned feelings, should, after the former seemed to have been fully developed, and the latter had found an object in whom they might repose, after their eccentric and painful efforts to find a resting place that such an one should at such a time, be cut off from life is something which we cannot contemplate without feeling regret; we can scarcely repress the murmur that she had not been removed ere clouds darkened her horizon, or that she had remained to witness the brightness and serenity which might have succeeded. But thus it is; we may trace the cause to anti-social arrangements; it is not individuals but society which must change it, and that not by enactments, but by a change in public opinion. The authoress of the "Rights of Woman," was born April 1759, died September 1797. That there may be no doubt regarding the facts in this sketch, they are taken from a memoir written by her afflicted husband. In addition to many kind things he has said of her, (he was not blinded to imperfections in her character) is, that she was "Lovely in her person, and in the best and most engaging sense feminine in her manners." de Dieser Titel ist in englischer Sprache. Dies war nicht nur eine Verteidigung der Rechte der Frau, sondern auch noch von einer solchen geschrieben. Ungeheuerlich! Mary Wollstonecraft, 1759 in der Nhe von London geboren, hatte es gewagt, eine radikale politisch-feministische Kampfschrift zu verfassen. Sie strafte somit all diejenigen Lgen, die der Frau von vornherein nur eins zubilligten: Von Natur aus ein gefhlsbetontes Wesen zu sein, welches -- unmndig und unfhig, fr sich selbst zu sorgen -- dazu bestimmt war, sich allenfalls um husliche Angelegenheiten zu kmmern. In dreizehn Kapiteln erlutert die Autorin ihre Thesen und erklrt, da Mnner und Frauen keinesfalls unterschiedliche intellektuelle Fhigkeiten haben und da die Unmndigkeit der Frau nur auf eine mangelnde Sozialisation zurckzufhren ist, bei der ihr Verstand systematisch unterdrckt wird. Als Konsequenz ihrer Schrift fordert sie eine Reform der Erziehung, um die weibliche Wrde wiederherzustellen. Die daraus resultierende materielle und geistige Unabhngigkeit der Frau wrde sich auch fr den Mann positiv auswirken. Wollstonecrafts leidenschaftliches Pldoyer fr die Rechte der Frau ist in der fr die Zeit typischen verschachtelten Art geschrieben, die immer wieder auch Querverweise in ihre Gedankengnge einbaut und sowohl sachliche als auch satirische Elemente aufweist. Das leidenschaftliche Pldoyer fr die Rechte der Frau wurde -- aller Kritiker zum Trotz -- richtungweisend fr die englische Frauenbewegung im 19. und 20. Jahrhundert. Es bleibt auch zuknftig ein wichtiges Zeugnis fr die Couragiertheit und Klugheit der Frau, ein lesenswertes Buch -- fr weibliche und mnliche Leser gleichermaen.
